Teslin Echo Fire Crew

Lightning Fire Management (LFM) is a subsidiary of the Deisleen Development Corporation and holds a yearly service contract for Fire Suppression with the Yukon Government's Wildland Fire Management. The contract is to provide a crew leader, 3 crew members/trainees and their transportation. This is a territorial service and the crew is deployed by WFM to fight fires where and when needed.

The Type 1 Initial Attack Crews are comprised of firefighters who are physically fit, highly trained and skilled individuals. Initial attack firefighters operate as part of a three-person (in Echo Crew's case a 4 person crew) and are usually the first on scene of a new wildfire. Once there, the initial attack crew works quickly to set up water pumps, remove fuel from the fire's path and dig fire guards to control or extinguish the blaze. The majority of fires in Yukon are responded to by initial attack crews who perform initial attack and sustained action activities on wildland fires.

Teslin Echo Fire Crew is comprised of:

Kevin Welin who has shown his competence in fire suppression as a Type 1 Crew Member with over 50 fireline days, on fires in which rotary wing and air tankers have been utilized in the suppression effort. This is the 5th summer that Kevin has worked as an Initial Attack member and the first as a Crew Leader.

Roan Evans-Ehricht has experience on at least 7 fires or a minimum of 60 hours of fireline duty as a Type 1 crewmember and is in his second summer as an Initial Attack crew member. Roan also has his Emergency Medical Responder Certificate.

Thomas Dewhurst joined LFM as an Initial Attack Crew Member Trainee. Thomas passed the WFX-FIT fitness test and the 10 day CIFFC S-131 Type 1 Crew Member Course. Tommy was deployed to the Haines Junction Fire and got his minimum of 60 hours of fireline duty as a Type 1 crewmember with satisfactory performance appraisals and is now a Certified Type I Crew Member.

Trenton Dupont joined LFM as an Initial Attack Crew Member Trainee. Trenton passed the WFX-FIT fitness test and the 10 day CIFFC S-131 Type 1 Crew Member Course. Trenton was deployed to the Haines Junction Fire and got his minimum of 60 hours of fireline duty as a Type 1 crewmember with satisfactory performance appraisals and is now a Certified Type I Crew Member.

Lands Update

Salmon

On April 11th, TTC was host to one stop of the Annual Yukon River Panel Education Exchange. Four individuals from the lower Yukon River travelled up to Whitehorse to attend the Yukon River Panel Pre-season meeting, and take part in the exchange in Teslin. Accompanying them were members of the Yukon Salmon Sub-committee, other Yukon First Nations fish and wildlife staff, TTC elders and Department of Fisheries & Oceans (DFO) staff. The exchange gave our guests from the lower Yukon a chance to see juvenile salmon for the very first time, and understand what salmon management is like in the upper river. It also gave other fisheries employees a chance to see TTC's restoration and enhancement projects up close and personal for the first time. Visitors were very impressed with the work TTC has been doing over the years, and were thankful for the steps we are taking in ensuring salmon for all, salmon for all

time. It was a successful visit and will play an important role in bridging the gap between Yukon First Nations and Alaskan First Nations in our fight to protect Yukon River Chinook.

Southern Lakes Caribou Management Planning

The Lands and Resources Department has continued to be involved in the management planning process for the Southern Lakes Caribou Herd. This process is First Nation driven and includes participants from nine governments including the six Southern Lakes First Nations as well as the Governments of Yukon, British Columbia and Canada. This group has been working hard to develop a management plan for Southern Lakes Caribou.

Over the winter the group lead a monitoring workshop which included demonstrations of the various monitoring techniques used by the different

Governments. The workshop alsoserved as an opportunity for Land Monitors and Game Guardians to talk with one another about caribou in their communities. This spring the group hosted a full day at the On the Land Gathering held by the Carcross/Tagish Renewable Resource Council. The 'Caribou Day' focused on sharing knowledge between Elders, Youth, Renewable Resource Councils and the management planning team, and included presentations, discussion, and activities about Southern Lakes Caribou and their importance to the people and ecosystems of the Southern Lakes. The Department of Lands and Resources would like to thank all TTC Citizens for their continued support and effort in conserving these caribou for future generations.







Update from Teslin Campus – Year in Review

As the Teslin campus winds down another semester, it is time to reflect on our year. We are proud to have a couple of Teslin-based students graduating from programs and a student moving into another program. Finally, we are closing out the year with the retirement of one of our esteemed colleagues. This year also featured several students taking credit courses by distance, our usual safety courses, and the delivery of professional workshops.

This year marks several significant milestones. We have two Teslin-based students graduating from Whitehorse-based programs who took all their courses from Teslin via distance. Kim Smarch graduated from First Nations Government and Public Administration program, and Dylan Jackson from the Office Administration program. These graduations are the first time in recent memory that we've had any Teslin-based students graduating from any program, much less two. We also have an upgrading student, Teslena Grant, who progressed through two levels of Math and an English this past year and will be taking the Business

Administration program at the main campus next fall. These successes say a lot about the institution's efforts to improve access to programming and student supports, and the determination and resiliency of our students.

Sadly, we are also saying goodbye to our colleague Ingrid Johnson, whose long relationship with the college pre-dates her time on the Teslin campus. She decided this past winter that it is time to retire and enjoy being an elder in Teslin. We will miss her wisdom, knowledge, and humour.

We had several students enrolled in upgrading or credit course by distance in all terms. In the Fall Semester, ten students took courses spread across four programs with one group of non-program students. In the Winter Semester, we had seven students taking courses from five different programs. Most of the students were parttime, and not all of them took their courses at the campus, but this is a significant jump from previous years. We have two students registered for spring courses in upgrading and early childhood, a first for the campus.

Above and beyond our first aid (wilderness and standard) and food safety courses, at the community's request we several driving-related courses such as air brakes, defensive driving, class 7 exam prep. We also hosted chainsaw safety and flagging courses in the spring. For professional workshops, mental health first aid and ASIST were popular courses, offerings coordinated in partnership with Yukon College's Northern Institute of Social Justice. Ingrid Johnson taught Introduction to Oral Traditions and Understanding Land Claims & Self-Government courses in April. In May, we hosted a very popular Introduction to Gardening course in partnership with Yukon College's Continuing Education and the Teslin Community Campus Committee.
